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What Spanish Courses to Take

The following information will help you select the Spanish course you need to take according to your proficiency level.

Spanish as a Foreign Language Track

A student can take Spanish as a Foreign Language if he/she is a native speaker of English or another foreign language. If a student has never taken Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 001-Elementary Spanish I (5 units). If a student has taken 1, 2, or more years of Spanish in high school or another institution, he/she may take the Spanish placement exam to determine his/her proficiency level. He/she may be placed in SPAN 002-Elementary Spanish II (5 units), SPAN 003-Intermediate Spanish I (4 units), or SPAN 004 – Intermediate Spanish II (4 units).

Spanish for Heritage Speakers Track

A student can be considered as a heritage speaker of Spanish if Spanish and English are spoken at home and/or Spanish is spoken very often. If a student can ask and answer questions orally in Spanish but he/she does not know how to read and write in Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 021-Spanish for Heritage Speakers I (5 units). If a student can ask and answer questions orally in Spanish and have basic knowledge of how to read and write in Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 022-Spanish for Heritage Speakers II (5 units).

Spanish Placement Test

If a student is not sure about his/her level of proficiency in Spanish, he/she may take the Spanish Placement Exam or consult with a faculty advisor in the Communication Building. The Exam will be given in Indio on May 3, 9, August 20 and 27 from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. in Room 112.

Pre-registration is not required. Be prepared to take the exam that will begin promptly.
